Introduction

How the months fly past! Here we are again, when it seems like only yesterday we were putting together the last bimonthly newsletter!

The biggest news for the school has been our move upstairs to a larger space (see right). Also, our new programs - medical Spanish, online classes, and the travelling programs - have all proven popular, keeping the school busy in what is usually heading into the quietest time of the year.

Through March and April we have maintained an average of around 15 students per week, in addition to several online students, with 18 students here in Quito at our peak.

On the foundation side we have been as busy as ever - getting the program of scholarships for Estero de Plátano children up and running (see page 2), continuing our work in Bua with the cacao growers, making a start on the renovation of the health center, as well as beginning work on the construction of a new classroom and library in Puca Chicta.

Donation News...

As a result of a project proposal submitted in December last year the Ryklow Trust from the UK made a donation of 750 pounds sterling to our project work in Bua, specifically related to Giovanny's work organizing a group of Tsa'chila cacao growers to improve production techniques and make their agricultura more sustainable. The money will buy tools, materials and seeds, and be used for training workshops.

We've Moved!


At the start of April we jumped at the opportunity to move our school upstairs in the same building. The move gives us more than 100 square meters of extra



and access to a mature garden for classes outdoors, a larger meeting room, expanded offices, and a dedicated space for our online classes.

But most importantly it makes our school the most attractive learning space in Ouito, with large windows with great views, great architectural features, and a very cosy feel.

With space for up to 35-40 individual classes per day, we should be well set for this summer, and possibly the next.



West Point Grey Academy in Puca Chicta

On the 14 of March our Shanti welcomed a group of volunteers from Westpoint Greys Academy of Vancouver, Canada, to Puca Chicta where they began work on the construction of a new classroom and library for the school. For four days they



worked alongside parents and teachers to lay the foundation for the new classroom. Their donation of \$2000 will be supplemented by a further \$1500 donated by Laure Sandoz from Switzerland, as well as a donation by the UK volunteer group that was also there in April. Laure is currently teaching English to the students of the school. We hope to finish construction and put the new classroom into use by the end of the summer.

Code of Ethics and Conduct:

With the indispensable help of Klaus Boas, we have completed a first draft of a **Code of Ethics and Conduct** that will put Yanapuma on a firm footing as a competent and trustworthy organization internationally. The draft code, based on the work of WANGO (World Organization of NGOs) has been approved, and we are currently in the process of forming an external board of trustees to oversee the foundation, although we expect this to take some considerable time.

Together with the development of a set of **Bye-Laws** and individual policies to cover all the different aspects of the work of the foundation and Spanish school, this will help us to create an organization that will comply with the most rigorous standards applicable to non-profits at the international level.

Klaus returned to Spain, where he now lives, but will continue to offer his invaluable help to us in the coming months as we continue to develop our institucional and organizational capacity.

Scholarships in Estero de Plátano

April saw the start of the new academic year at the coast, and Yanapuma staff were busy in March with the unenviable task of choosing the 6 students who would receive funding to study at college from the 35 applications that we received. We had each student complete a form and send additional materials like school reports. Additional criteria that we used were the family status (living with family or single mother, income level, etc), career aspirations, participation in community events as seen by staff and volunteers, etc. In the end we chose 7 students, committing ourselves to find a little extra funding to cover the 7th during the coming year.

One question will be whether \$250 is enough to cover the whole year after uniforms, books, and supplies are bought, and daily transport is taken into account. But this is the first time, so we are prepared to learn along the way and we will have a better idea for next year.

And speaking of next year, we are already seeking possible funding sources for next year, to expand the program with 2 or 3 new students each year. We also aim to include complementary education on such issues as sexual and reproductive health and rights and interpersonal communication to ensure that these students receive a good education and adequate preparation to lead their community forward in the future.

Volunteers from the LEAP UK

On the 1st of April 25 volunteers arrived from the UK to carry out project for up to 10 weeks in Caimito, Chilcapamba, Puca Chicta, Estero de Plátano, and Kamak Maki. Split into two groups, they will each spend time in the Amazon rainforest, the Andean sierra, and on the Pacific coast, working on projects to build classrooms, school dining facili -

Ecotoilets in Bua - Training Day

On 22 April, Azalia spent the day in the school in Bua training the parents in the use and maintenance of the 6 ecological toilets that we built last year. As the academic year has just begun, they are now receiving full use.

A current drought in Bua has underlined the need for waterfree sanitation solutions, conserving the little that there is for

hand-washing and drinking. The good news is that the children are using them well, with only minor problems up to now. Several other schools in the area have expressed interest in similar systems.

We will continue to monitor and evaluate their use to ensure that we are providing a reliable and sustainable solution to the disposal of human waste.

EcoEscuelas . . .

With the help of Erica from England, Klaus from Germany, Justine from France, and Yanapuma staff we are developing a project to work with Ecuadorian schools to make them more ecological and to introduce environmental themes into the curriculum.

The Eco Schools movement has grown in Europe and other countries of the world as a primary means of promoting the Milennium Development Goals among a new generation.



And in the UK, a program called the Global Dimension in Education aims to teach youth about the inter-dependency between developed and developing countries and the need for sustainable development.

Yanapuma aspires to spearhead this movement in Ecuador in the coming years as part of this global education program.

Volunteer Ecuador:

Yanapuma's Volunteer Ecuador program continues to attract a good number of volunteers for projects around Quito and the rest of Ecuador. During March and April the program had an average of 18 volunteers placed in different communities and projects at any one time, in addition to the 7 interns that are working in Yanapuma and Eos Ecuador, our complementary travel agency.

Things quieten down a little in May, but we expect a big influx during June and especially July, when the summer vacations begin.

Giovanny continues to build the Tsa'chila farmers confidence in improving their cacao growing, as well as beginning a reforestation project that will come to fruition in September when a Thinking Beyond Borders group will plant thousands of trees in Bua.

In Estero de Plátano, Kyle continues to encourage community participation in a variety of projects, including building a new dining room in the school with a group of volunteers, as well as working to solve recycling, waste and drinking water problems in the community.



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
